Try reading the following words out loud: *boy, toy, coin*. Do you notice anything about the <u>vowel sound</u>? You should be able to hear <u>two different</u> <u>vowel sounds</u> in one syllable – these are called <u>diphthongs.</u>

Diphthong comes from the <u>Greek</u> word <u>diphthongos</u> which means "having two sounds." Notice the *di*- for "<u>double.</u>" So diphthongs are <u>double vowel sounds in words like *chair*, *fear*, or *pout*. If two vowels in <u>a row are the same, as in *boot* or *beer*, then it's not a diphthong.</u></u>

Turning back to true diphthongs, how do we know that diphthongs do constitute one vowel sound and not two? By contrasting them with other vowel sounds. Compare the following pairs:

- *buy* vs. *bee*
- *slayed* vs. *sled*
- *loin* vs. *lawn*
- brown vs. bran
- coat vs. cot

In each of these examples, **the only difference between the pairs is the vowel sound**: The first all have diphthongs and the second have simple vowels, but they mean different things. This tells us that a diphthong counts as one vowel sound (or phoneme) and can change the meaning of the word.



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
