Try reading the following words out loud: *boy, toy, coin*. Do you notice anything about the **vowel sound**? You should be able to hear **two different vowel sounds** in one **syllable** – these are called **diphthongs**.

Diphthong comes from the **Greek** word **diphthongos** which means "having two sounds." Notice the *di-* for "**double**." So diphthongs are **double vowel sounds in words like chair, fear, or pour**. If two vowels in a row are the same, as in *boot* or *beer*, then it's not a diphthong.

Turning back to true diphthongs, how do we know that diphthongs do constitute one vowel sound and not two? By contrasting them with other vowel sounds. Compare the following pairs:

- *buy* vs. *bee*
- *slayed* vs. *sled*
- *loin* vs. *lawn*
- *brown* vs. *bran*
- *coat* vs. *cot*

In each of these examples, **the only difference between the pairs is the vowel sound**: The first all have diphthongs and the second have simple vowels, but they mean different things. This tells us that a diphthong counts as one vowel sound (or phoneme) and can change the meaning of the word.
